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THE HELLENIC COAST GUARD EQUIPMENT PROGRAMME

Since the end of 2019, the Hellenic Coast Guard (HCG) has defined a comprehensive needs assessment of over 800 M € setting the target for its investment plan which is implemented step-by-step in coherence with the available funding capabilities and in particular through the Border Management and Visa Instrument (BMVI) of the Home Affairs Funds, the European Maritime, Fisheries and Aquaculture Fund (EMFAF) and other instruments of the Structural Funds.

- This ambitious investment plan was elaborated to comply with the recommendations issued further to the Schengen Evaluations and to the Vulnerability Assessment of the European Border and Coast Guard Agency (FRONTEX) and is focused around 3 strategic objectives:
- **a)** Improve early Maritime Domain Awareness in HCG area of jurisdiction through the procurement of state-of-the-art surveillance equipment both ashore and onboard the operational assets.
- **b)** Enhance HCG response capacity both in terms of velocity and range through the upgrade and the procurement of operational assets, ensuring in parallel the full operational availability of the fleet through regular maintenance and adequate infrastructures.
- **c)** Upgrade of the quality level of the response provided through the adequate and continuous training of the staff and the procurement of modern individual equipment.



3 In this regard, for what concerning the first strategic objective :

- a) The Call for competition under restricted procedure for the development of the National Integrated Maritime Surveillance System (NIMSS), of a budget of 62 M €, is ongoing. After its implementation, this system will ensure real-time and 24-hour surveillance of a large part of the maritime area of responsibility of the HCG, contributing decisively to the protection of the external maritime borders of the EU, to the fight against all forms of crime as well as to the protection of human life at sea. The project will be co-funded under the BMVI.
- b) After many appeals, the tendering procedure for the extension, upgrade and modernization of the National VTMIS (Vessel Traffic Monitoring and Information System), of a budget of 49 M €, is coming to an end. This project co-financed by the "Transports Programme" under Structural Funds aims to monitor, control and regulate maritime traffic in the wider area of 10 ports of the country, while improving the safety of navigation, the quality of the Search and Rescue services provided, as well as the protection of the marine environment.
- c) A contract of 3,15 M € co-financed by the EMFAF for the development of the Northern Aegean Maritime Traffic Surveillance and Monitoring System is being implemented. The project foresees the installation of three (03) sensor stations in the wider area of Alexandroupolis to control the access to the port and to monitor the maritime area including the island of Samothraki.
- d) A tendering procedure is under preparation for the procurement of two (02) Mobile Surveillance and Coordination Units of a total budget of 3 M € to be co-funded by both BMVI and INTERREG EL-CY.
- e) In parallel, a call for tender is foreseen for the procurement of ten (10) Thermo-Vision Vans of a total budget of 10 M € to be co-funded under BMVI.



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Regarding the second strategic objective, it is worth mentioning that:

a) The flagship project of the HCG under BMVI 2021-2027 will be the procurement of two (02) Offshore Patrol Vessels (OPVs) over 80 m. length with a total budget of **180 M €** and a possible option for up to additionally two. These vessels will be equipped with state-of-the-art maritime surveillance devices including two (02) VTOL remotely piloted aerial systems. Moreover, the vessels' helipad will be capable of accommodating up to an 11-ton helicopter in order to ensure maximum interoperability with other national and European Authorities.

b) Another main project is the procurement of 3+3 Coastal Patrol Vessels of over 30 m. length with a total budget of 108 M €. These vessels are ideally equipped for surveillance missions of the external maritime borders and specially configured for the rescue of persons in danger at sea.

c) For the first time the HCG applied the Competitive Dialogue procedure for the procurement of 5+5 and 7+7 fast patrol boats over 17,5 m length, with a total budget of 81,6 M € (3,4 M € each), respectively co-funded under BMVI and EMFAF. The first contract is being implemented and three of these boats have already been delivered.





d) Over 34 out of 62 patrol boats up to 13 m. length have already been delivered. The total contracts value exceeds 31 M € and is co-funded under both BMVI and EMFAF. Additionally, four (04) out of eleven (11) patrol boats specially configured with medical equipment have been delivered. The contract of 6,6 M € is co-funded under the BMVI.





- e) Another planned procurement concerns ten (10) ultra-high-speed "interceptor" patrol boats over 18 m. length, with a speed exceeding 60 knots, budgeted 45 M € co-funded under the BMVI.
- f) Through the operating support of the BMVI, various contracts of a total value of 5,2 M € are ongoing for the follow-on support of land and surface HCG operational assets.
- g) After the activation of two contracts for regular maintenance through the NATO Support & Procurement Agency (NSPA), the HCG aerial fleet is fully operational and the mid-life upgrade of six (06) helicopters and three (03) maritime surveillance airplanes is now considered to be co-funded with a budget of over 70 M € under the BMVI in order to improve their operational capabilities. Moreover, the construction of a new hangar budgeted 6,53 M € is to be launched.



Finally, concerning the third strategic objective :

- **a)** The on-the-job training of HCG cadet officers and cadet harbor guards in external borders HCG local Authorities is co-funded under BMVI with **6 M €** in order to prepare them beforehand to the challenges they will face during their career.
- b) In parallel, under the same funding, dedicated trainings are on-going for the HCG staff on Integrated Border Management issues (600.000 €) as well as specialized trainings for the aerial means personnel (1 M €).
- c) About 10 M € have been earmarked under BMVI for the procurement of personal specialized devices to enhance the digitalization of controls in the HCG areas of jurisdiction.
- d) Finally, about 5 M € under Internal Security Fund 2021-2027 are planned for individual protective equipment for HCG staff as well as for the anti-bombing squad.
